#### Community and Global Service **Climate Corner Recycling Light Bulbs**

Our Earth Care Team invites you to continue celebrating Earth Day all year long as we all learn more about how we can protect and nurture God's amazing creation. Our focus this month is on household light bulbs.



Unfortunately, not all light bulbs can be recycled. Incandescent bulbs are not accepted for recycling and need to be tossed into the trash. First wrap them in heavy paper to prevent broken edges from cutting through your garbage bag and creating a mess. This protects you and your waste hauler from accidental injury.

Lowe's and Home Depot both accept CFL (Compact Fluorescent Light) bulbs at their indoor recycling areas. (You can take rechargeable batteries there, too.) Because CFL bulbs contain mercury, they should never be thrown in the trash.

Only the EnviroStation located at 1401 S. Martin Luther King Jr. Drive accepts fluorescent tubes. You can also take halogen bulbs, LED lights, and Christmas lights to the EnviroStation; they are open Wednesday through Saturday 9:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. If enough bulbs still work in a string of lights you can stuff them in a jar or vase and enjoy them a while ~ Global Service Committee longer.
